

As Odisha transforms and progresses, we reaffirm our commitment to building the finest success stories and scripting new journeys of accomplishment.

















It was with great pride and joy that as part of our Odia Pakhya observance we had a special session on the legendary Odia primer, Chhabila Madhu Barnabodha, for all grades. Written by Bhaktakabi Madhusudan Rao, and first published in 1895 with eight editions thereafter, Chhabila Madhu Barnabodha became part of every Odia household. It demonstrates how Odia alphabets, words, word formation and phrases can all be taught in a simple manner, using imagery of animals, birds, seasons, and sceneries with short verses. Understanding our mother tongue is essential to our identity and for learning pure Odia, the Chhabila Madhu Barnabodha remains incomparable as the introductory primer. The session had a considerable impact on children, who enjoyed learning about this historic primer, while mentors joyfully presented it to them.

Continuing our observance of Odia Pakhya, we screened a documentary on Hirakud Dam for children to learn about the significance of this technological marvel - the longest earthen dam in the world, and the first major multipurpose river valley project in independent India. Mentors explained its construction, the reservoir the dam created which is one of the largest artificial lakes in the country, the purpose served by the dam, how it helps irrigate thousands of acres of agricultural land, while also providing power to industries and communities, and how the reservoir has enabled avifauna to flourish.

As we move steadily ahead on the journey of acquainting our children with Odisha's immense art and culture legacy, we continue to focus on different aspects of the rich traditions that give Odisha its preminent position in the world. Keeping with our Odia Pakhya observance, children got glimpses of Odisha's historical stone carving and sculpture through a special presentation highlighting our monuments. From the stone elephant carved above the Ashokan rock edict at Dhauligiri, through the caves of Udayagiri, and the Buddist Mahavihara at Ratnagiri, culminating in the Sun Temple of Konark, children saw and learnt about these heritage sites that highlight the skills of Odisha's master artisans.

Every drop is precious, every drop counts!

Our youngsters marked the onset of the Odia New Year, Pana Sankranti, with the age-old practice of putting up the Basumati Theki, making Pana, sharing information about the day's traditions, closing with partaking of a special lunch comprising Odia dishes that are offered as prasad, marking the day.

Inculcating practices that are deeply connected to our rich cultural heritage - learning to make the season's traditional summer cooler 'Pana' that marks the Odia New Year, has been on the Wisdom calendar since inception. Odia cuisine is traditionally defined by seasonality, so much so that seasonal calendar dates are named after food and drink like 'Pana Sankranti'. 'Pana' is made, consumed and shared starting on Mahabishuba Sankranti, the Odia New Year which marks the beginning of summer. Made with different combinations of fruits, especially wood apple (Bael), yoghurt, and milk products like 'chhena' and 'rabdi', Pana is nutritious and greatly beneficial for health and immunity in the hot summer months. Wisdomites learn and imbibe these practices, helping them to engage with our cultural heritage early on.

Putting up the Basumati Theki - the sacred earthen pot tied from a bamboo and coconut leaf canopy over a tulasi plant, into which they poured Pana, the signature cooling drink of the season, and water, that would drip down in drops over the tulasi through the day, keeping it watered. This ritual is symbolic of the need for water and shade to be available for all to keep cool, during the ensuing summer that sets in with Pana Sankranti, and, a pointer to serve water to all thirsty beings as obligatory humaneness.

#### Start of Academic Session 2025-26



### **HAPPY 77TH, BELOVED BHUBANESWAR!**



Celebrating our city - an article written by our Vice Chairperson, Ms. Panchami Manoo Ukil; published in March 2018, it speaks volumes even today! Here it is, for your reading pleasure:

#### My City My Pride

I came to Bhubaneswar when I was five years old — in the early seventies. I remember it was the time when spring was stepping into summer, and, the huge mango trees in the sprawling garden had burst into inflorescence, their umbrella canopies layered with pale pistachio-green spears of tender mango blossoms. The air was fragrant, the sense of openness was liberating. The love for the place was instantaneous and kept growing over the years. I went to boarding school in Jaipur in 1976. At that time, almost no one in my school knew where Bhubaneswar was, and I was always asked if it was in Bengal. Today, I preen with an overwhelming sense of pride, when the same unknown city is declared as the number one smart city in India, and is the only Indian city to feature in the global list of smart cities.

As I write this piece, I look out of the window of my office to see a lane completely shaded by entwined top branches of trees. Bhubaneswar was a clean and green city in the seventies and eighties, with forested outskirts barely a few kilometres away, and, now, after more than forty-five years, and a super cyclone decimating a huge number of the city's trees in the interim, I'm so relieved that my city remains one of the cleanest and greenest cities in India.

As Ekamra Kshetra, my city's heritage roots are unique and timeless. The stunning temples of Bhubaneswar stand testimony to our unique style of architecture, the sheer number of temples reflecting not only architectural prolificity of our kings, but also their consciousness about preserving our history, culture, and tradition. I love the "Rukuna Ratha" celebrations of Lord Lingaraj on Ashokashtami, as also the beautiful "Dola Vimanas" during Dola Purnima and the ISCKON Ratha Jatra. I never get bored of repeated visits to the temples in the old city, with the iconic depictions unfolding new tales on every visit. Now, with Ekamra Van and its rich repertoire of botanicals on the banks of Bindusagar, our temple trail is truly an enriching and therapeutic experience. I'm proud of being a part of that historical landscape which converted a demolisher and devastator king to an apostle of peace.







In the eighties, one of my friends moved to Bhubaneswar from Delhi as her father had joined Nalco. After a few days of getting used to a "slow and sleepy" place, the north-Indian family had decided that Bhubaneswar was going to be their retirement destination. They bought a home in Palashpalli, and even though they ultimately did not settle here, they make an annual trip just to unwind, calm down the pace, and destress.

For me, this is the essential and inherent character of this beautiful city of Bhubaneswar – it's unhurried pace. Even as it transitions from an unheard-of small town to a smart city, Bhubaneswar has managed to retain that leisurely pace to an extent. We Bhubaneswariyas still remain cocooned from the frenetic rush that's built into lifestyles in other cities.

As single roads in the city double and quadruple, "talkie" cinema halls rub shoulders with multiplexes, 'ek number haat' and market building compete with layered shopping malls, Burma General Stores metamorphoses into Kalamandir, Casino Rolls shifts location, bungalows convert into multi-storeyed apartments, ambassadors and fiats give way to snazzy rolls royce, audis and BMWs, cyclerickshaws get grounded for autos, bus stand moves from AG roundabout to Baramunda, multi-national companies set up Infocity, traffic snarls create momentary chaos, etc, etc, yet the city continues to move in its unhurried pace, calm and mostly unruffled.

Today, Bhubaneswariyas may not be indulging in the once ubiquitous midday snooze, but a certain laid-backness defines them, enabled by the pace of the city, which is what makes Bhubaneswar a habit for its inhabitants, and attractive for its visitors. I guess this is also the reason behind Bhubaneswariyas and of course, Odias, in general, happily lacking aggression and killer instinct, and just being satisfied with what they have.

In the last few years, the city's famed cool evening breeze of summer has made a comeback. Spring and summer evenings laced with this breeze are one of the city's most distinctive and enduring memories. At a time when air-conditioners were far and few, it was this breeze, almost poetic in flow and sweetness, that lent succour to warm summer evenings. As the city expands its limits, we have our open and green spaces in the many beautiful parks interspersed into the urban landscape. Today, Bhubaneswar has a smorgasboard of restaurants, small and big, with every cuisine on offer. Eating out is popular and the eat streets are always crowded. It holds a place of pride in the field of education as a prominent education hub with students of the many modern sought-after institutions lending a youthful charm to the people scape. I love the fact that we are now experimenting with cycle tracks and "Raahgiri", even as biker clubs, bird walks, heritage walks, music in the park, art in public spaces, literary, music, and dance festivals, theatre, and lot more are being woven into the city's activity agenda for its citizens, thereby inducing a cosmopolitan feel to the city.



I'm hooked to the "Abhada" of Ananta Vasudev temple and Boya "kora-khai" as much as I'm crazy about Lingaraj lassi, Ramadevi chaat and Master Canteen gupchup. I can't have enough of watching the orangey-blue dusk skies at Bindusagar or feeding fish in the tank at Mukteswar. I revel in the festive spirit of "baara maasa- tera parba" which seizes Bhubaneswariyas in an infectious frenzy of activity on roads, and, in the market place, radiating the buzz and energy of finding joy in the simple things of life. That all of these have survived generations of Bhubaneswariyas, speaks volumes of the sense of attachment with our beloved city and its underlying ethos.

And as an avid birdwatcher, I'm besotted with my city's avian diversity. Our urban green spaces and immediate forest outskirts are home to many species of birds, and during our bird walks, we have listed close to 180 species of birds in Bhubaneswar. What I deeply regret however, is the complete desertion of Bhubaneswar by house-sparrows, who have been our chirpy companions for generations. Also, I'm sad about the disappearance of the hordes of vultures, the natural city scavengers that were seen until the late-eighties.

On the other hand, I'm thrilled with the presence of the rarest of rare Pale-capped Pigeon/Columba punicea that inhabits one of our most populated city parks. Birdwatchers from all over the world come to Bhubaneswar to see this rare avian species which is listed as "Vulnerable" by IUCN. All the more reason why Bhubaneswar city authorities must adopt this bird as the official bird of Bhubaneswar Smart City, just as all other major cities have their official birds.

Bhubaneswar is an amalgamation of tradition and modernity, of rootedness and smartness. It's a comfort zone out of which one would move out only as a compulsion arising from circumstances. Fortunate are those who have been able to stay on without break. Also fortunate are those who have managed to return after years of rushing through life, to the lap of a city that still cares and shares. As I watch my city bloom and get smarter, I say without hesitation – My City, My Pride!






# Srimad Bhagavad Gita and Bharatamuni's Natyashastra inscribed on UNESCO's Memory of the World Register

Introduced and led by our Vice Chairperson, Ms. Panchami Manoo Ukil, as a critical component of learning life skills, children learn the shlokas and their meaning, and then they listen to audio files to get the intonation and pronunciation just right. Shlokas that highlight behavioural skills, duty, responsibility, coping, care for nature, mindfulness and balance, the right time for action, standing up and getting counted are in the curated list. Shared with children and parents through special presentations, the content is also visually appealing which gains the interest of the young audience. We firmly believe that as they grow into adulthood, the wisdom of this philosophic treasure will indeed have an impact on their quality of life.










It is a highly detailed compilation of writing on dramatic art.


It is said to be written by the mythic sage Bharat Muni.



### WHAT IS KATHAKALI?

Kathakali is a major form of classical Indian dance from the state of Kerala. It originated from Kerala nearly 300 years ago.

Movements in Kathakali are influenced by ancient martial arts and athletic tradition.

Kathakali combines devotion, drama, dance, music, costumes and make up into a rich experience for all who view it. It retells great stories of the past, mostly from Indian epics, and leaves us spellbound at the intricacies involved in the performance.

### WHAT IS KATHAKALI?

The Kerala Kalamandalam is the main centre for Kathakali Artists.

The costumes, make-up and face masks make this dance form unique.

Kathakali has similarities with other dance forms like that of the Japanese 'Noh' and 'Kabuki' dance forms.

This dance form is famous all over the world for its elaborate costumes, amazing make-up and beautiful ornaments.







#### WHAT IS KATHAKALI?

The main themes in Kathakali are mostly mythological. Stories or chapters from the Ramayan, Mahabharat and Bhagvat Purana form the dancedrama like performance of Kathakali.

Kathakali has similarities with other dance forms like the Japanese 'Noh' and 'Kabuki' dance forms.

The costume is elaborate and the face is painted in vivid hues. Actorsdancers of Kathakali apply make-up according to the roles they play.

The make-up in Kathakali is based on a colour code - like green for noble or royal characters, red for bad/evil, while women use yellow paint for the face. The colours are symbolic and reflect certain categories of emotions and gunas (attributes).


### **KATHAKALI COSTUME & MAKE-UP**

Kathakali make up is an elaborate process and takes more than 3 hours to complete the look of one dancer. It helps in giving a superhuman look to the dancers.

All the colours used in the make-up are obtained from natural substances and herbs. For example, the red and yellow colours are made by powdering stones. A mixture of lime and rice flour serves for white. The green colour is produced by mixing Manayola stone powder and Neelam (indigo blue). Coconut oil is used as the base for mixing these stone powders. Another stone, Chenchilyam is powdered and applied in order to protect the skin from burns. Kanmashi or Kajal (the black substance) is prepared by burning gingelly oil. Kumkumam or saffron is also used for the make-up.

Odissi belongs to the genre of classical music, distinguished by its unique Sangita-Shastras (musical treatises), a specialized system of Ragas and Talas, and a distinctive style of performance. Odissi music has a rich legacy dating back to the time when Emperor Kharabela, the ruler of Kalinga, patronized this music and dance. Odissi dance, one of the classical dances of India is performed solely with Odissi music. Emerging from the ancient traditional music ritual dedicated to Lord Shree Jagannatha, Odissi music has varied compositional forms written in Sanskrit and Odia. It was originally the music offered as a Seva or service to the Lord of the Universe, and the tradition continues unbroken to this day. Shree Mandira is still considered the fountainhead of Odissi music, and, the most ancient and authentic compositions survive in the temple tradition even today. Continuing efforts to acquaint our young people with their cultural heritage, our Vice Chairperson, Ms. Panchami Manoo Ukil introduced children to acclaimed classical vocalist Vidushi Sunanda Patnaik rendering the famed devotional 'Jibana Patra Mo Bharicha Kete Mate'. She spoke about the rich legacy of Odisha's music tradition, of devotionals, and musical practices. The endearing response from children was heart-melting as they listened - hands folded, eyes closed, sitting still, listening in rapt attention. On our journey of Experiential Learning, each day has special moments, each day shines differently.

Ancient Odisha was a great maritime power from 7th century BC to 13th century AD. Ports of Odisha and its maritime connections find mention in travelogues of famous scholars, geographers and historians like Ptolemy, Pliny, Fahien and Hieun Tsang. That extensive trade existed between Odisha and Cambodia, China, Java, Sumatra, Indonesia, Malaysia, Bali, Vietnam, Sri Lanka, Rome and Greece is evident from the ancient artefacts found across the state at archaeological sites, from Sisupalgarh to Ganjam. As part of our efforts to introduce children to the expansive heritage and maritime legacy of our state, Boita Bandana and Kartika Purnima are observed annually with curated activities in school. Additionally, to augment children's knowledge of the historic legacy, they were taken on a visit to the Odisha State Maritime Museum. It was an enriching outing, and a unique experience for all.
